

UPDATED COVID-19 INFORMATION

As of 1st July the NSW Government will further ease restrictions for a number of things including attendance at Mass.

The number of people permitted in the church to attend Mass or for private prayer in

St Mary's Church will be 80

St John the Baptist Gulgong 47

St Malachy's, Rylstone 40

St Dominic's, Kandos 50

with social distancing of 1 person per four square meter.

The church is open for Mass and visitation Tuesday - Thursday 9.15 -10.30am Friday 11.30am - 1.00pm. We apologise we cannot leave the church open at all times as we don't have the man power to have someone be there at all times for cleaning.

It is no longer necessary to book to attend Mass either during the week or for weekends.

You will be required to continue to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving the church and to supply your contact details on the sign in sheet provided on entry to the church as has been the practice in recent times.

PLEASE DO NOT ATTEND if you have any flu like symptoms or if you are deemed in the vulnerable category.

FUNERALS: Restrictions have been eased, again to the capacity of individual churches with social distancing.

BAPTISMS: We are now able to celebrate baptism. Please register via the Parish Office. We will be able to have 2 baptisms only at any one time to meet requirements.

SACRAMENTS:

We await further instruction as to when and if we will be able to celebrate Confirmation, First Holy Communion and First Reconciliation in 2020.

LIVE STREAMING OF THE SUNDAY MASS will continue for a short time.

CHURCH CLEANING:

The church surfaces need to be continually cleaned after each service. We would be most grateful for names of people willing to assist, particularly on the weekends where most of the church needs to be done. Please contact the Parish Office if you can assist on a Saturday/ Sunday roster. It will only take a short time with extra helpers.

First Reading: 2 Kgs 4:8-11. 14-16

That is the holy man of God, let him remain there.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

Today we are faced with the cost of discipleship, but we are also comforted by the promise of the providence of God. Baptism is for us both death and life. Through it we enter into Christ's death and we die to lives of selfishness and sin. Through it we rise with Christ to a new life freed from everything that previously held us down. As glorious as this new life might be, it requires death to our old ways of living, and this is always difficult.

The cost of discipleship cuts right to the core of our beings, it lays bare the very structures of kinship. Baptism recreates us as children of God; through it we are given a new life and born into a new family. The bonds of discipleship are now even stronger than the bonds of blood. Discipleship requires our very lives. As disciples we can no longer put ourselves first. We must be

Second Reading: Rom 6:3-4. 8-11

Having been buried with him through baptism, we shall walk in a new life.

When we were baptised in Christ Jesus we were baptised in his death; in other words, when we were baptised we went into the tomb with him and joined him in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life.

But we believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over him any more. When he died, he died, once for all, to sin, so his life now is life with God; and in that way, you too must consider yourselves to be dead to sin but alive for God in Christ Jesus.

Gospel Acclamation Apoc 1:8

Alleluia, alleluia! You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy people. Praise God who called you out of darkness and into his marvellous light. Alleluia!

Gospel: Mt 10:37-42

Anyone who does not accept his cross is not worthy of me. Anyone who welcomes you, welcomes me.

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Anyone who prefers father or mother to me is not worthy of me. Anyone who prefers son or daughter to me is not worthy of me. Anyone who does not take his cross and follow in my footsteps is not worthy of me. Anyone who finds his life will lose it; anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it.

'Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and those who welcome me welcome the one who sent me.

'Anyone who welcomes a prophet because he is a prophet will have a prophet's reward; and anyone who welcomes a holy man because he is a holy man will have a holy man's reward.

'If anyone gives so much as a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is a disciple, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward.'

willing to spend ourselves and to be spent, to serve others in the day to day unfolding of life. We may find such commitment very demanding, but that is part of the cost of discipleship. God promises that if we lose our lives in this way, we will really gain them. If we are unselfish in the way we share ourselves with others, we will be enriched through our generosity. If we spend ourselves and are spent in our service of others we will be filled with blessings unimaginable.

The Front Line of Service

Another day and another dollar - well, not really. The young man dressed in the dark and prepared to leave the house to work his next 12-hour shift. He took a last look at his sleeping wife and peeked in on their sleeping toddler daughters. He headed to the car and as he pulled out of the driveway, he wondered what his day would hold. Would there be personal protective equipment to protect him? Would his colleagues be able to come to work or would they be short staffed? Would the test results he had requested be available? Would the man he had sent to ICU have survived the night? How many patients would he see today? Would this be the day he, too, became a victim of this mysterious and vicious virus? Or was he already?

Every time the young doctor stepped into the emergency room, he knew the risks - not only for himself but for his beloved young family. And yet, he entered the room once again. He has been one of many selfless heroes who have served our country in these recent months. These first responders are compassionate, competent, selfless, and courageous and we will never be able to adequately thank them. They have "lost" their familiar lives in order to preserve the lives of others. They have carried the cross, day after day, in a way that will forever change them - and all of us. We trust in the life that will come from their sacrifices, because we are people of faith. Yet we live still in the midst of it all.

Gospel Focus – Anyone who welcomes

Having spelled out the difficulties of discipleship throughout Ch 10, the gospel writer has Jesus reassuring the disciples that anyone who welcomes them welcomes him. There are echoes here of other parts of the Gospel of Matthew: the Beatitudes, with its blessings on the poor and humble of heart; the welcome of children, the 'little ones' of the kingdom; and the Last Judgment (Mt 24), that reminds us that whatever we do for the least in the world we do for Jesus. Jesus even describes the disciples as 'little ones' – a reminder both to them and to those who welcome them.




SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT
