SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER—YEAR B 7TH APRIL 2024 OF DIVINE MERCY

First Reading: Acts of the Apostles 4:32-35 The whole group was united, heart and soul.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 117:2-4. 15-18. 22-24. R. v.1

(R.) Give thanks to the Lords for he is good, his love is everlasting.

Let the sons of Israel say: 'His love has no end.' Let the sons of Aaron say: 'His love has no end.' Let those who fear the Lord say: 'His love has no end.' (R.)

The Lord's right hand has triumphed; his right hand raised me up. I shall not die, I shall live and recount his deeds. I was punished, I was punished by the Lord, but not doomed to die. (R.)

The stone which the builders rejected has become the corner stone. This is the work of the Lord, a marvel in our eyes. This day was made by the Lord; we rejoice and are glad. (R.)

Second Reading: 1 John 5:1-6

Anyone begotten by God has already overcome the world.

Gospel Acclamation:

You believe in me, Thomas, because you have seen me; happy are those who have not seen me, but still believe! Alleluia!

Gospel: John 20:19-31

After eight days, Jesus came in and stood among them.

Reflection

'In reality,' Pope Francis points out, 'Thomas is not the only one who struggles to believe.

In fact,' the Pope adds, 'he represents all of us a little bit.' But Thomas does not only represent us with his explicitly articulated doubt. Rather, Thomas highlights our tendency to walk away. Thomas had absented himself from the community. Returning, he seems a touch transactional: Show me the proof, then I'll commit!

As Pope Francis highlights, Jesus answers Thomas' doubt 'in front of everyone, in the community.' It was, the Pope suggests, as if Jesus was telling Thomas that 'if you want to meet me, do not search far away; remain in our community, with the others, and don't go away. Pray with them. Break bread with them.' Be open to encounter, not closed to possibilities.

This, evidently, is a lesson for us too. Every Christian generation is called to find the Risen Christ together. We belong with each other, with Christ forming a mystical unity out of our diversity.

In this, the story of Thomas has another lesson for the Church. We Christians are called to be a welcoming people. 'Let us ask ourselves,' the Pope suggests, 'if in the name of Jesus' wounds, we are willing to open our arms to those who are wounded by life, excluding no one from God's mercy but welcoming everyone.'

After all, despite his attitude Thomas was still included and welcomed by the community whose testimony he doubted. Even more pointedly, Our Lord opens his exchange with the doubter with some clearly welcoming words: 'Peace be with you.'

St Matthews "Bright Beginnings" Playgroup Sessions


We invite all families with children who are

REFLECTION FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

The Voice of Thomas

A major theme of the Scripture readings is 'Jesus in the flesh'.

The reading from Acts reflects the powerful effect the Resurrection had on individual believers and on the Christian community. It describes a Christian community in which everyone shares what they have with others. Bearing witness is much more important than collecting wealth. They act with one heart and one mind, and the Spirit is at work in their ministry.

The psalm is a prayer of thanksgiving for God's mercy. The first verse emphasises again and again that God's mercy endures forever. The psalmist finds courage in the Lord even when the psalmist feels he is falling. Again we hear, like last week, that the cornerstone that was once rejected is now the most essential of all.

The second reading shows us that faith and love are inseparable in the life of a Christian. Faith can overcome the evil in the world. The love of Christians for one another reflects the love of God. The water and blood mentioned here allude to the waters of baptism and the blood of the Crucifixion.

In last Sunday's Gospel reading, Jesus' followers found an empty tomb, with no sign of Jesus. In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus comes to them later that night and stands before them, even though the doors are locked. The first words Jesus says are, 'Peace be with you.' As additional evidence that it is really he who suffered and died, he shows them the wounds in his hands and side. Then Jesus sends them forth to forgive the sins of others. He promises them the gift of the Holy Spirit so that they will be the 'flesh' of Jesus to carry on his mission.

Thomas isn't there the first time Jesus appears, and he has trouble believing what he is told. A week later Jesus appears again with the same greeting, 'Peace be with you.' Jesus shows Thomas his wounds. At once, Thomas confesses his faith. Jesus blesses those who believe without seeing – Christians such as ourselves.



Thomas had doubts about Jesus being alive. He wanted to see Jesus' hands and side before he would believe that Jesus had come back to life.

Scriptural context -

Not an ending?

The final two verses of today's gospel passage (Jn 20:30-31) read like the conclusion to the whole gospel. They are a statement of finality about the purpose for writing the gospel and something of a blessing for those who read it. Yet, surprisingly, there is another whole chapter that follows this passage that deals with still more post-resurrection appearances. Most scripture scholars believe that the end of Chapter 20 was the original ending of the gospel and that Chapter 21 is a later addition — possibly added by the community for whom the gospel was originally written.



Have you thought?

Those who have not seen

Jesus says to Thomas, 'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' That's us! Jesus' words in the gospel are meant for people like us living today. We are not in the position of Thomas and the other disciples who were able to see the risen Lord face to face and so convince themselves of his rising. The gospel recognises that to believe in resurrection without the that physical, personal encounter with Jesus is to be celebrated even more. Happy are we – blessed are we – who have not seen and yet still believe!
