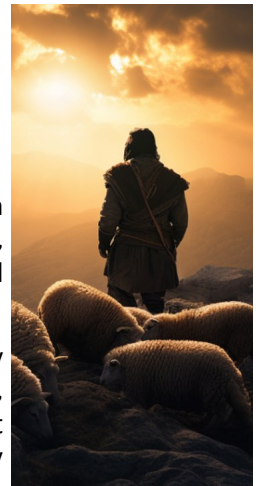
Dear Friends in Christ,

Just over a week ago, I had the joy of ordaining two new priests for our Diocese: Fathers Cong Van Hoang and Duong Van Ha. These men, like all our priests are not, as the Gospel today reminds us, merely "hired hands." They have generously offered their lives to share in the work of the Good Shepherd.

Every Christian has his or her part to play in the mission entrusted to the Church; and the dignity of each vocation is enhanced in appreciating more deeply the specific service of each one. Today, we give thanks for the unique and irreplaceable gift of the ordained priesthood, which does not exist for itself, but to serve the pilgrim Church. It is both an awesome call and, properly understood, a humble office.

For Catholics, this is a day not only to pray and give thanks for the priests who generously serve us, but to recommit ourselves to supporting them. This means a willingness to be generous in our own service, working with them for the Church and her mission. It also means playing our part in ensuring that their modest material needs are cared for.

Each year, we also make a collection on this day to help meet the expenses of training future priests. In the old days, the expenses of educating seminarians were met by their families. These days, we accept that this is a responsibility to be shared by the whole local church.



At the moment, our Diocese has five young men at various stages of formation and discernment. You can contribute to their support either through your own parish, or directly on-line at bathurst.catholic.org.au.

Please pray for the priests we have, for those who are preparing for ordination; and for those whom the Lord is calling to leave everything and follow him.

Watch out for scam emails (phishing)

Scam emails or phishing (pronounced 'fishing') are emails that are often made to appear as if they were sent from individuals or organisations you think you know, or you think you should trust. They are designed to trick individuals out of their money and information. Phishing communications often mimic professional phrasing, branding and logos of authentic businesses in order to appear genuine. They are designed to defraud individuals and businesses by: requesting or pretending to confirm personal information, passphrases or credit card numbers; demand payment for a fake account; or by tricking them into clicking a harmful link or attachment. Attachments may contain malware, which is software designed to harm your computer or to gain access to your computer without your knowledge.

Phishing is not just limited to email. These scams are delivered via SMS, instant messaging and social media. Phishing is becoming increasingly difficult to identify, as cybercriminals adapt their methods and find new ways to steal money and data.

General rules to follow:

- Never believe emails that have different names within the email body, email address or the sent from fields.
- Do not open messages or their attachments, or click on links from unfamiliar individuals or organisations.
- Remember that reputable organisations including banks, government departments, online shopping and social media companies will not call or email to verify or update your personal information. This includes companies such as Amazon, PayPal, Google, Apple and Facebook.
- Do not provide personal information to unverified sources and never provide someone with remote access to your computer.
- Keeping your devices up to date with their software updates (computers, phone, Tablets etc..)
- Never share passphrases with others.
- Use strong unique passphrases for every account.

REFLECTION FOR YOUNG PEOPLE by Lisa-Marie Calderone-Stewart**The Voice of the Shepherd**

A major theme of the Scripture readings is 'the voice of the shepherd'.

The reading from Acts shows the early Christian community continuing the work of Jesus and celebrating the power to heal and save in Jesus' name. Peter is in a lot of trouble with the Jewish leaders because he is preaching and healing in Jesus' name. The healing miracle is a sign of the salvation that came in Jesus, but Peter is still rejected by those who will not accept Jesus' messiahship. They do not believe that the only path to salvation is through Jesus.

Today's responsorial psalm repeats the theme of the last four Sundays: 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone.' Rejected by Israel, Jesus is now the very foundation of faith. We are told to trust the Lord instead of earthly princes. This is a psalm of thanksgiving all the way through, and we are told that those who do all in the Lord's name will be blessed.

In First John, Christians are called children of God who enjoy a very close relationship with God. Unfortunately, being God's children is not without risk. The world fails to recognise them. At the same time, being children of God promises a remarkable future.

In today's reading from the Gospel of John, Jesus likens himself to a humble shepherd. But unlike shepherds who work for pay and might abandon the sheep when danger appears, Jesus lays down his life for his sheep. Jesus regards all people as his sheep, not just those who join his flock as Christians.

We, as Christian members of Jesus' flock, are called to be shepherds like him – not to lead with power and ambition, but to put the welfare of others before our own welfare.
