St Matthews Students head to Vietnam.

Over the past two years St Matthews science faculty have developed a strategic partnership with the University of Sydney, and Professor Patrick Brennan, to strengthen students science skills. Students are mentored by Professor Brennan and his research team whilst undertaking research in the area of breast cancer detection. As part of this program 11 students this year have the opportunity to travel to Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam to undertake an experiment to assess Vietnamese radiologists ability to detect cancers from breast mammograms. The results of this experiment will be used to design education programs to help increase Vietnamese radiologists breast cancer detection efficacy. The students will be meet Professor Brennan and his team in Ho Chi Minh City on 16th November and will work with his team through to 23rd November to collect data. The students will be accompanied by Mrs Brooke Colley, Dr Louise Puslednik and Nam Le. Whilst the focus of the excursion is to carry out research all the students and staff are all very excited to be able to share this cultural experience with Nam.

READINGS FOR NEXT WEEKEND:

World Day of the Poor next Sunday 18th November.

His Holiness Pope Francis has designed the 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, 18th November as the Second World Day of the Poor.

The Holy Father notes that there are many different forms of poverty and he asks us to consider "Who are the poor?" He describes how we only recognise the voice of the poor in silence and then, having listened, we must answer. Our responses, he suggests, calls for a "loving attentiveness which honours the person and seeks out his/her best interests.

"Poverty is not brought on by itself, but is caused by selfishness, pride, greed and injustice."

The Holy Father invites us to make concrete the words of the Psalm 22:27: "That the afflicted shall eat and be satisfied". His Message contains a very practical suggestion: the sharing of the Sunday meal with the poor.



Remembrance Day, 100 years since The Great War's end.

Remembrance Day has a special significance in 2018. Sunday, 11 November 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the Armistice which ended the First World War (1914-18).

One hundred years ago, on 11 November 1918, the guns of the Western Front fell silent after four years of continuous warfare. With their armies retreating and close to collapse, German leaders signed an Armistice, bringing to an end the First World War. From the summer of 1918, the five divisions of the Australian Corps had been at the forefront of the allied advance to victory. Beginning with their stunning success at the battle of Hamel in July, they helped to turn the tide of the war at Amiens in August, followed by the capture of Mont St Quentin and Peronne, and the breaching of German defences at the Hindenburg Line in September. By early October the exhausted Australians were withdrawn from battle. They had achieved a fighting reputation out of proportion to their numbers, but victory had come at a heavy cost. They suffered almost 48,000 casualties during 1918, including more than 12,000 dead.

In the four years of the war more than 330,000 Australians had served overseas, and more than 60,000 of them had died. The social effects of these losses cast a long shadow over the postwar decades.

Each year on this day Australians observe one minute's silence at 11am, in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed conflicts.

Keep an Eye Out for Widows

I remember a youth-group leader I met in a Central American village. He proudly told me how his group collected food for poor people in his community each Christmas. I later saw the youth-group leader's home – a thatched hut he shared with a large family. Despite his poverty he focused on helping other people.

That youth-group leader has become one of my role models. I hope that I can someday show generosity like that.


Jesus talks about role models in this week's Gospel. He contrasts the scribes and the rich people with the widow. The scribes, Jesus says, draw attention to themselves, seeking the crowd's praise. Some rich people make large donations, but none that require real sacrifice. Meanwhile, a widow quietly sacrifices from her meagre income to offer something to her religion. Widows were some of the poorest people in Ancient Israel.

Where do you look for role models? Our culture often promotes modern-day scribes as role models for young people to follow - athletes and corporate CEOs who flaunt their wealth, politicians who love their power, and religious leaders who profit from their connections to powerful people.

Jesus says, look for another way if you are seeking a life of holiness. Search out people who make quiet but significant sacrifices for others. Think about your parents. How have

they sacrificed to improve your life? How

about your teachers? Many teachers don't make a lot of money, but stay committed to teaching because they like helping young people. Don't forget the people who are working at your parish. Church workers often work long hours because they believe the world needs to hear Jesus' message.
