




Scriptural context

Parables of the lost

The three parables that appear in Luke 15 are unique to the gospel of Luke – none of the other gospels use these parables. They are used by the gospel writer to further highlight a theme that runs throughout this gospel: the release and acceptance of those who are oppressed and afflicted. It stems from the declaration of Jesus' mission in Ch 4 when he reads from the scroll of Isaiah. More than any other gospel, this one portrays Jesus as having a special care and compassion for those who have been rejected by society.

New Executive Director of Schools appointed for 2020

Bishop Michael McKenna has appointed Mrs Christina Trimble as the new Executive Director of Schools for the Diocese of Bathurst.

Mrs Trimble will succeed Mrs Jenny Allen, who retires at the end of this year. Her appointment was made on the recommendation of senior members of the Diocesan Catholic Education Council, with the assistance of a professional recruitment firm.

With a career in Catholic education spanning more than 35 years, Christina Trimble has spent the last five years in a senior executive role with Sydney Catholic Schools, providing her with a great perspective across the K-12 educational learning environments. Prior to this appointment, she had been principal of two Catholic secondary colleges.

Bishop McKenna looks forward to the fine contribution that Mrs Trimble will make. He paid tribute to the excellent work of the retiring Director, Mrs Allen: "Christina will be able to build on a solid foundation laid by Jenny Allen: in educational quality, sound administration and commitment to the mission of the Church".

Mrs Trimble will join the Catholic Education Diocese of Bathurst team in early January to ensure a smooth transition prior to Mrs Allen's departure.

REFLECTION by Diane Bergant CSA

The God who spoke to Moses is pained by the depravity of the people yet moved to show them mercy. Who could ever have imagined such a God? The God depicted in the gospel actually searches for what is lost. He seems to abandon the safe ones for the sake of the one who has strayed. She goes to great lengths to find one coin. As a spurned yet loving father, God patiently waits until we come to our senses. Who could ever have conceived of such a God?

Our God seems consumed with an insatiable desire to reestablish a relationship with us after we have turned our backs on God, have chosen to commit our loyalties elsewhere, have thoughtlessly wandered off into danger that threatens our well being, not God's. What is it about us that makes us so desirable? The answer has less to do with us than with the magnanimous character of God. It is almost as if unconditional love is not simply a characteristic of God, but God's very essence and no human frailty or depravity can change this.

Paul insists that it is through Christ that all of this is accomplished. It is through the sacrifice of Christ that the depraved are forgiven, that sinners are saved, that the lost are found. It is through Christ that we are sought by God, and Christ is the very gift of mercy, the forgiveness of our sins, the celebration of our return.

God Never Gives Up on You

I remember meeting Harry many years ago as he walked down the street past the church where I worked. Many young people had told me Harry was a problem young person. When I said, "Hi," he said, "You don't want to know me".

That saddened me. Harry, a senior school student, had accepted his reputation and saw himself as a problem.

But God never sees anyone as a problem. Jesus makes that clear in this week's Gospel. In fact, Jesus shows how God goes above and beyond to love people who struggle with faith.

That's hard for humans. We can be quick to label people as problems. Or, we look at our own failures and give up on ourselves, just like Harry did. So if you've ever felt that way, you're not alone.

This Gospel offers two challenges. First, don't write yourself off. Sin doesn't anger God; it moves God's compassion. So turn toward God. Pray. Go to reconciliation. Seek guidance from an adult you trust. Let God's compassion embrace you and your faults. That compassion will help you start over.

Second, don't write anyone else off. Each person has a talent the world needs. Ask God to help you see the potential in people who seem to struggle with sin or failure. You can be God's encouragement to them.

God helped me reach out to Harry when he saw himself as a problem. He eventually helped start a parish outreach program, and his life made a huge difference to other young people.

That's why God never gives up!
