

Dear Friends in Christ,

When I am asked how Catholics should vote in the Referendum to be held on 14 October, my answer is "conscientiously." I do not believe that bishops should, in our democracy, direct their people to vote one way or another in any election.

However, it is our duty to remind Catholics to take their responsibilities as voters seriously; and to help them inform and form their consciences. Whether you vote "yes" or "no" in the coming Referendum, it is important that you know what you are doing. Let your yes be a carefully considered yes, or your no be a carefully considered no. To think "I don't know enough, and can't be bothered finding out" is not a responsible option.

This year, the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, in collaboration with the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC), published a statement entitled "Listen, Learn, Love", about past issues and those we continue to deal with in the relationships between indigenous and non-indigenous Australians. I encourage you to read it at <u>https://socialjustice.catholic.org.au/2023/08/22/social-justice-statement-2023-24/</u>.

I also encourage you to read the 2017 Uluru Statement from the Heart (<u>https://ulurustatement.org/the-statement/view-the-statement/</u>) which sets out concisely and eloquently the aspirations for truth-telling, treaties and a voice. The Australian bishops, after listening to NATSICC, the voice we set up three decades ago to advise us, endorsed the Uluru statement more than two years ago. Last year, it was also endorsed by the Plenary Council.

Whichever decision you come to, whatever the result of the Referendum, I would ask you to respect those who take a different view. And I would hope that all of us, whichever way we vote, whatever the outcome, would recommit to healing the wounds of dispossession which have been passed on from generation to generation.

IN OPENING OF THE 16TH ORDINARY ASSEMBLY OF THE SYNOD OF BISHOPS

"Dear brother Cardinals, brother Bishops, sisters and brothers, we are at the opening of the General Assembly of the Synod. Here we do not need a purely natural vision, made up of human strategies, political calculations or ideological battles. If the Synod allows this to happen, the "other one" will open the door to it. This we do not need. We are not here to carry out a parliamentary meeting or a plan of reformation. The Synod, dear brothers and sisters, is not a parliament. The Holy Spirit is the protagonist. We are not here to form a parliament but to walk together with the gaze of Jesus, who blesses the Father and welcomes those who are weary and oppressed. So let us start from the gaze of Jesus, which is a blessing and welcoming gaze."

YOUTH -by Lisa-Marie Calderone-Stewart We Heard It Through the Grapevine

A major theme of the Scripture readings is 'How is the harvest?'

Vines and vineyards wind their way through most of today's readings as we learn how our farmer God cares for people.



Isaiah sings a story song about a friend with high hopes for a new vineyard. The friend did all the planning, picked the right spot, weeded and turned over the soil. No expense was spared. The vineyard owner planted only the best vines and built a wine press and watchtower in anticipation of the choicest grapes and wine. But only wild grapes grew on the land. They were not even good for eating. So the friend abandoned the land to the weeds and thorns and grazing animals. Isaiah tells the story to warn Israel that while they were chosen as God's vines in God's vineyard, they are not bringing forth good fruit.

The psalm continues Isaiah's theme. The people of Israel are the vine carried safely from Egypt and planted in a new land. The Israelites did a lousy job of taking care of the vineyard. The psalmist asks God to give Israel another chance. God is asked to continue caring for and nurturing the people.

The last part of Paul's Letter to the Philippians comforts the people in times of anxiety. All their troubles can be brought to God in prayer, and they will receive a peace and a sense of quiet that are too wonderful to even try to understand. Paul urges the people to keep their eye on what is good and right, to live by Jesus' example.



Jesus' vineyard parable, found in today's Gospel reading, is much like the first reading, and it has much the same meaning. Jesus tells the parable to warn the chief priests and elders that they have mismanaged the Kingdom of God. They haven't listened to the prophets, and they do

not listen to him. The Kingdom of God awaits those who lovingly care for it and bear a rich harvest of faith.

First Reading: Isaiah 5:1-7 The vineyard of the Lord God of hosts is the House of Israel.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 79:9. 12-16. 19-20. R. Is 5:7 (R.) The vineyard of the Lord is the House of Israel. You brought a vine out of Egypt; to plant it you drove out the nations. It stretched out its branches to the sea, to the Great River it stretched out its shoots. (R.)

Then why have you broken down its walls? It is plucked by all who pass by. It is ravaged by the boar of the forest, devoured by the beasts of the field. (R.)

God of hosts, turn again, we implore, look down from heaven and see. Visit this vine and protect it, the vine your right hand has planted. (R.)

And we shall never forsake you again: give us life that we may call upon your name. God of hosts, bring us back; let your face shine on us and we shall be saved. (R.)

Second Reading: Philippians 4:6-9 Do these things and the God of peace will be with you.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia! I call you friends, says the Lord, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father. Alleluia!



Gospel: <u>Matthew 21:33-43</u> He leased his vineyard to other farmers.

REFLECTION

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The metaphor of the vineyard, cherished by both ancient Israel and the early Christians, suggests that while vines might be hardy, they are also vulnerable. So is the reign of God. It must be tended and protected from what might endanger it, so that it may produce abundant and delectable fruit. In the gospel account, the vine does indeed produce an abundant crop. In fact, it is the very productivity of the vineyard that sets the stage for the treachery described. We can see ourselves in both uses of the vineyard metaphor. There are times when, regardless of what God seems to be doing for us, we simply rebel against God's plans. We stand in defiance. There are other times when we, who are disciples of Jesus, act as if the kingdom is ours. We might even marginalise or force out others with whom we do not agree, so that we have sole control. When we consider the justice of God, it is important that we place it within the right context, lest we create a picture of God that is false and misleading. It is because of God's tender love for the vineyard that treachery cannot be tolerated. If we have produced unacceptable fruits, it is for our own good that God steps in and dismantles the structures that enabled us to produce bad fruit. It is appropriate that God would snatch the vineyard from our grasp and entrust it to one who will faithfully carry out God's plans.
