REFLECTION

Wedding Garments at Baptisms!

The servants of the king went out and gathered in 'all whom they found, good and evil alike'. They respond, drawn by the attractive prospect of sharing in the life of the Lord of the Feast, and they are welcomed, whether good or evil.

What about the king's (God's) question to the wedding guest? 'My friend, how come you are here without a wedding garment?' The guest might have replied: 'Because of dire poverty', or 'Lack of time', but the story goes on, 'But the guest was silent'. The guest was tongue-tied because he was caught out having decided not to enter into the spirit of the occasion.

That is why, at every baptism, we look for a signal of commitment to respond to the spirit of the occasion, by the wearing of a white garment. This anticipates the later receiving of Holy Communion which is a foretaste of the Feast of Heaven.

We could pause for a moment at this Mass to enter into the Spirit of the occasion wearing the garment of our baptismal commitment.



What is synod, and how is it different?

In the past, a Synod consisted of a meeting (called a "General Assembly") of Bishops in Rome. This Synod consists of the entire synod process, beginning with the worldwide consultation of all faithful, including a General Assembly of Bishops in Rome, and ending with the reception by the People of God in the local Churches of the fruits of the entire discernment process.

Although previous synods also began with wide consultations in the form of questionnaires, this is the first time that everyone has been directly asked to engage in an exercise of listening at the level of parishes and dioceses.

God's Word

Will You Come to the Banquet?

A major theme of the Scripture readings is 'The banquet is ready'.

These readings move from the vineyard to the banquet table and the fine feast the Lord has prepared for the people.



The feast described in the first reading is

enough to make anyone hungry. The Lord is the host, and the feast is in honour of the guests. More than just giving food to the guests, God promises to wipe away any tears and to destroy any hold that death may have. This banquet is a reminder of God's limitless love for the people.

The responsorial psalm, Psalm 22, is often called the shepherd psalm. The refrain, 'I shall live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life', is an expression of confidence in God. The shepherd guides people to God's house, protecting them from evil and caring for them. Here, too, a table for feasting awaits with a cup overflowing with drink. God's house is all we have ever dreamed of and more!

In his Letter to the Philippians, Paul is probably writing from prison. He speaks about how Jesus' followers must take the good with the bad. There are times when things are plentiful and other times when things are scarce. Friends have sent a gift to Paul in prison, and he thanks them for their generosity and asks God to bless them. Paul urges them to accept their suffering and to strive for unity in their community.

In the Gospel reading, Jesus uses the parable of a wedding banquet to once more try to get through to the chief priests and elders. Twice the guests receive personal invitations. Some refuse. Others are too busy. Some even insult and kill the messengers. Finally, the king has had enough of these noshows, and he burns their city to the ground. The king still needs some guests, so the servants go out and round up anyone they can find. Later, the king finds one guest who is dressed in the wrong manner. When asked about the inappropriate attire, the man has nothing to say, and he is tossed out into the night.

The first guests are God's Chosen People, and the prophets are the ones delivering the invitations. But the sinners and outcasts of society are the ones who end up sitting at God's table. In the mini-parable at the end, we learn that as Christians, just showing up is not enough. To be a guest at the table means that we must have the character that marks the Christian life. In the parable, that character is symbolised by the wedding garment.



We are fortunate to have a visiting choir, The Cathedral Singers, visiting the Mudgee Parish, Saturday 21st October.




but they have since become ecumenical and sing cathedralstyle music.

Have you thought? - Inclusivity

This gospel parable reflects the inclusive way in which Jesus lived his life. In many ways, Jesus was a scandal in his society because he didn't obey the social boundaries. He was very clear in being inclusive and attentive to those who were normally shunned. Today, those boundaries are just as clear and easily identified but the methods of excluding people have perhaps become a bit more subtle. Who are the 'shunned' and 'left out' in our society today? Where do the boundaries lie? Who would Jesus be reaching out to and seeking to

include in today's society?

Gospel Focus - 'How did you get in here?'

In light of the inclusive kingdom metaphor in this passage, the final portion of the gospel may be a bit troubling to readers. When a guest is not wearing a wedding garment he is cast out of the banquet. We might say that being invited at the last minute the guest was unable to find suitable clothing. It is a sign that although he has been an unlikely inclusion in the banquet, he has not made any effort to respond to the generosity of the king and take up one of the cloaks that would have been provided and thus give due honour to his host. This is symbolic of those who refuse to change their ways and do not live as followers of Jesus even when they have been included in the kingdom.

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
